"I've been a special for about six months. It has given me really great experience, and a lot more confidence in my day-to-day job as a lifeguard. I tend to volunteer for the weekend shifts, some of the more extreme jobs I have been to include domestics and fights in progress. It does give you a different perspective on the island. "I wanted to be part of policing and it was my line manager who encouraged me to join as a Special Constable; the training consisted of two weekends of classroom based teaching and two weekends of Officer Safety Training. I was sworn in as a Special in December 2018 and since then I have worked several shifts in the custody suite and others patrolling on Friday evenings; most recently I worked on Liberation Day and at the Muratti. I particularly enjoy the community aspect of policing and the face to face interaction with the public; however, there are many challenges to overcome, particularly dealing with people who have mental health issues.

“I also really enjoy learning from the officers – there are quite a lot of younger officers, but their maturity, knowledge and professionalism continues to impress me. Every officer I have worked with has been engaging and shared some of their experiences with me; I ask a lot of questions about the job and they have all been very supportive and patient with me.
